Conference Overview

Symposium 2023: Professional Identity in Nursing: What's in it for me? is the sixth annual event hosted by the International Society of Professional Identity in Nursing (ISPIN) at the University of Kansas School of Nursing (KUSON). This year, we explored strategies to form and foster professional identity in nursing, described effective teaching and learning strategies for professional identity in nursing to use in education and practice, and identified ways to enhance collaboration between nursing education, practice, and research.

Over the past year, ISPIN has continued to grow. Some highlights include:

- ISPIN Advisory Council has grown to 30 members
- Held ISPIN Business Summit in May 2023
- ISPIN has developed a strategic plan for 2023, including continued development of process and structures, dissemination, and marketing/business development
- Continued quarterly updates on Zoom
- Finalized PIN conceptual model to be used for intervention studies
- Ten active workgroups
- As of July, ISPIN has put out 45 publications, 10 blogs/editorials, 10 webinars/podcasts, 101 presentations, and 7 research studies completed/in progress
- Over 570 contacts on the e-news mailing list

As in previous years, the symposium was a hybrid event (in-person and virtual). This year, in addition to e-poster presentations, we held our first in-person poster presentation session. Many thanks to everyone who submitted their work for consideration. Ten were approved and shared at the event.





Shelly Amsberry

Dan Butcher

Dr. Butcher completed his Registered Nurse training and first degree in Sheffield, UK in 1991. Posts working in Respiratory Medicine and a Community Hospital setting were followed by a move into Palliative Care nursing. Dr Butcher achieved post-graduate qualifications in Health Psychology and in Education whilst working in various clinical and research roles. In 1999, Dr. Butcher took up a full-time Lecturer in Health Care position as part of the original team that established the university's Swindon campus. He completed an EdD qualification with research examining the development of Professional Identity amongst first year nursing students He is now based at the Marston Road campus in Oxford where he is Course Lead for the Professional Doctorate in Nursing (DNurs) and also contributes to BSc (Hons)/MSc pre-registration in Adult Nursing programmes delivered by the Oxford School of Nursing and Midwifery. Dr Butcher is a Senior Fellow of the Higher Education Academy in the UK and co-leads an international collaborative project examining professional identity development.

Sandra Davis

Dr. Davis is the Deputy Director for the NLN/Walden University College of Nursing Institute for Social Determinants of Health and Social Change. Prior to joining the NLN Dr. Davis was an Associate Professor and Inaugural Associate Dean for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion at the George Washington University School of Nursing. With over 20 years in faculty, administrative, clinical practice, and leadership roles Dr. Davis brings depth, breadth, and passion to her work. Through her leadership, Dr. Davis is making an impact in the area Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) on local, national, and international levels. Globally, she held round table discussions at Riverside College in Bacolod, Philippines to discuss DEI with faculty and students. Nationally she was a contributor to the NLN Vision Series, "A Vision for Integration of the Social Determinants of Health into Nursing Education Curricula." Most recently, Dr. Davis was invited to join the National Commission to Address Racism in Nursing. Locally, Dr. Davis was the Principal Investigator on a Photovoice Project; "The Social Determinants of a Heart Healthy Community" that was exhibited at the Smithsonian National Museum of African American History and Culture.

Dr. Davis's research interests include inequities in health, social and structural determinants of health, and antiracism. Dr. Davis co-published an article in Academic Medicine entitled Let's Talk about Racism: Building Structural Competency in Nursing. She has a chapter titled, "The Evolving role of Social Determinants of Health to Advance Health Equity" in the Shaping Nursing Healthcare Policy book and recently co-authored a book, Fact Facts about Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion in Nursing: Building Competencies for an Antiracism Practice.

Dr. Davis is board certified as an Acute Care Nurse Practitioner and is Past President of the Nurse Practitioner Association of the District of Columbia. She is an AACN/Wharton Executive Leadership Fellow, a Leadership for Academic Nursing Fellow, and a Fellow in the American Association of Nurse Practitioners. Dr. Davis is a 2020 -2021 inductee in the Temple University Distinguished Alumni Gallery of Success.


Amy Hite

Dr. Joseph's areas of expertise are leadership effectiveness, innovativeness across academia-practice, and the General Effectiveness Multilevel Theory for Shared Governance (GEMS), the only theory-based program for shared governance implementation in nursing practice. Champion obtained a Bachelor of Science in Nursing Science from the University of Zimbabwe, a Master of Social Science in Nursing from the University of the Free State, a Master

of Health Professions Education with a specialization in Assessment and Accreditation (with distinction) from Keele University in the United Kingdom and a Doctor of Philosophy in Nursing from the University of the Free State. He also holds a Fellowship with the sub-Saharan FAIMER regional institute (SAFRI) and an International Fellowship in Medical Education.

He has more than 10 years' experience in primary healthcare and nursing education. Champion was instrumental in developing competency-based programs for undergraduate nursing education in various contexts within the African region. His research is around the development of a competent workforce that can influence the health parameters of the contexts they serve. He has published more than 30 research articles, and his research has been presented in various international platform. He supervises Master and PhD students in nursing and in health professions education.

Champion's work has been recognized both locally and internationally. Locally, he has been awarded best education research paper, Kerneels Nel Medal for best educational research paper in 2020 and first place to innovative ways in engaging students at the UFS. Internationally, Champion was honored by the SIGMA organization as "Emerging Nurse Researcher and Scholar in the African region in 2020.


Marlo Robinson

Mother's Care was founded in 1998 and is celebrating its twenty-fourth year in business having successfully served more than 4,000 pregnant and postpartum families in the South Florida birthing community. 
